

Ironic Christmas Present

At our Christmas Gift Exchange I traded with Janice because she got a bottle of wine, which they wouldn't drink, as I would enjoy it. So, before I got the chance to open the BIG box I said sure. Little did I know that box had a prize winning bowl created by our own member, Bobby Darr. Packed in this gift bag with the wine was an August 1970 issue of Lapidary Journal. The magazine had many long articles not like the magazines of today. The irony in this is there is an article about Idar Oberstein, Germany. I had just recently given the program on Idar Oberstein after our travel to Germany this year. I found the magazine interesting. In it is also an article on India's Gemology and Lapidary history. It was very interesting and here are a few excerpts on how to make your own precious minerals and gems you can make at home. Ha ha!

How to make rubies: Mix an equal proportion of calcined shell and vermillion, both powdered. Shake the substance in a bottle so as to mix it thoroughly. Pour out the substance grain by grain and place it on fire. All these grains will be perfect rubies.

How to make sapphires: Mix equal amounts of

burned mother of pearl shell and indigo. Shake well the substance, pour out drop by drop and boil it. You will get good looking sapphires.

How to make emeralds: Mix an equal quantity of madder root, indigo, and orpiment. Shake well the mixture in a glass bottle until it is well blended. Pour out grain by grain and boil. All the grains will turn into perfect emeralds.

How to make coral: Mix equal amounts of burned mother of pearl shell and vermilion. Pulverize it and soak in milk of cow that has recently calved. Wrap this mixture in a bunch of grass blades and will it with a hollow bamboo stem or some other tube. Place the stem in a good earthen pot together with rice pulp. Then cover the pot and let it cook on slow fire. Add sesame oil. Thus will be formed coral inside the bamboo stem, red like a ruby. Oiled in the manner for six hours on slow fire, the coral will be smooth, brilliant and fluted.

So, for those of you that feel like gem crafter and can create this magic in a bottle or tube. Please let us know how your experiments pan out.
